Employee Spotlight - Wayne Holly

With a list of questions in hand, I recently spent some time with Wayne to get a glimpse of his life when he is not manning the helm of Sage Rutty.

My first question was to find out a little bit more about

Wayne and how he and Judy became involved with foster care. We all know that Wavne and Judy have huge hearts and that they have been fostering children for the past 20 years or so. Their decision to foster came after Jessica began school and the presence of a baby in the house was missed. They quickly found themselves bringing home babies in need of the nurturing love that their family could provide. Currently, they are fostering their 53rd child.

You would think that the foster care experience, coupled with raising their own six children (Trevor, Jared, Connor, Sean, Jessica and Shane) and being a grandfather to four would make Wayne an expert in handling young children and their boundless energy! I was a bit surprised by Wayne's answer to my next question. When I asked him what he would be terrible at doing if Judy were to give him a "Honey-Do" list, Wayne answered that he would be terrible at caring for the kids for more than 48 hours as he

lacks the temperament and patience to handle young children for so long!

Wayne had to think for a few minutes about my next set of questions. First, I asked what skill he would like to master if he could. Enthusiastically, Wayne told me that he would love to learn to restore cars or motorcycles. I watched Wayne's eyes briefly glass over as he visibly daydreamed about a metallic blue 1970's Chevelle SS. Wayne rapidly fired off vintage features describing the small details that he would include while restoring this dream car. I'm sure that it's a beauty!

My next question centered on adventure and what would be the most amazing trip to go on. Wayne told me about how he and Judy would like to go on a safari in Africa or to see the Fjords and the Aurora Borealis in Norway and Sweden. I asked him if he was the thrill-seeking type that would want to experience some sort of rush while on one of these trips (thinking Devil's Pool at Victoria Falls).

Wayne's answers were evidently driven by thoughts of Judy and that she would not want to do anything that daring. Observing this, I asked him what he would do if the trip were solo. With a big smile, Wayne told me he wouldn't hesitate to hike Mt. Kilimanjaro.

I still wanted to know a bit more about Wayne's home life. Wayne's days generally start out with him waking up the kids, followed by making Judy her coffee and a trip to the gym when his schedule permits. Shifting gears, I asked him how he relaxes after a long and difficult day. Wayne's cure for a grizzly work day would be a vodka tonic, enjoyed outside on the patio with Judy, followed by making dinner together and listening to music. I asked Wayne if he enjoys reading to help take his mind off some of the day to day pressure and stresses. While he admitted that he does like to read, he isn't one for reading fiction.
